Have you ever wondered how many archaeological sites there are in Arizona? No one knows – yet anyway.

However, almost all of the archaeological sites that have been identified and recorded by archaeologists are now included in AZSITE, a Geographic Information System that serves to consolidate information from at least 51 different agencies that collect cultural resources data for the State of Arizona.

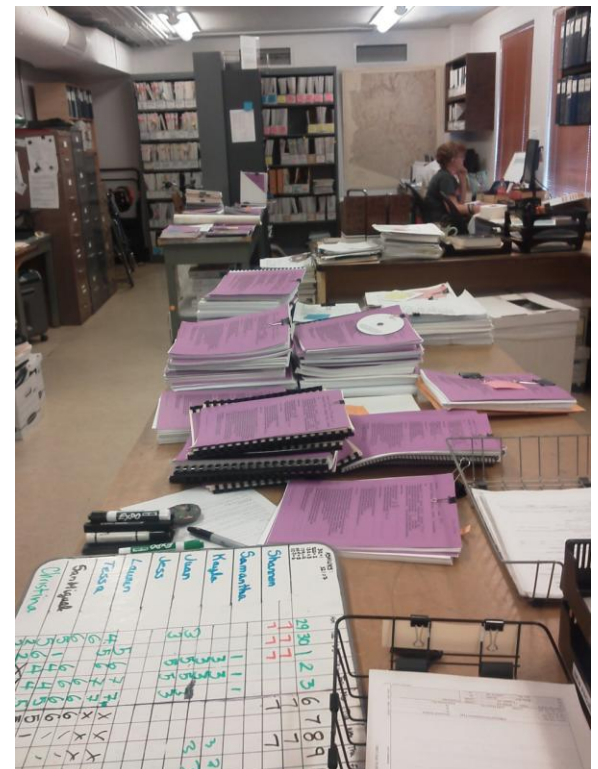
Now in its 20th year of development and 14th year of online data distribution, AZSITE is self-contained and functions without any State or University funding. Yet with the help of multiagency cooperative agreements, and graduate, undergraduate, and even high school students working with Arizona State Museum staff, AZSITE has become the ‘go-to’ resource for the latest information on archaeological and historical sites within the state and 40 miles all around it.

In this month’s Third Thursday program, AZSITE’s manager Rick Karl will discuss some of the trials and successes of multi-agency cooperation to protect cultural resources, and how the system has continued to grow over the last two decades to become the ‘wanna-be’ model of every other state in the union. Rick will show and talk about how AZSITE works, its various applications that make resource research and protection easier, and future developments already under way. (Hopefully he also will provide the latest count of archaeological sites that have been recorded in Arizona.)

This month’s presenter: Old Pueblo’s guest speaker for this “dinner-format” program is Ricky J. Karl, the Archaeological Geographic Information Administrator and AZSITE GIS Manager at the Arizona State Museum, University of Arizona (ASM), Tucson.
